Going The Distance

he distance from Manila to Toronto is great. Dr. John Suk should know. As the final candidate in the ICS' presidential search he covered that distance by plane twice in less than a month.

The distance from Asian Theological

Seminary professorship to the ICS president is also great. John Suk knows that too. He'll cover that distance in April 2006 when he becomes the Institute's fourth president.

As president elect, John Suk fits well with the qualities needed to lead a global, Christian graduate school. An engaged

scholar, he earned a PhD in Speech
Communication at Wayne State University in
Michigan. His dissertation on the Promise
Keepers rhetoric demonstrates his on-going
interest in the importance of purposeful
scholarship for maturing Christian thought.
Of his academic career, John says, "My
diverse education has made me a good critic
of our culture and a scholar with deep
appreciation for interdisciplinary studies,"

That love of the interdisciplinary accompanies his knowledge of the deeply religious nature of academia. Dr. Jonathan Chaplin, ICS' acting academic dean, summarizes John's ability this way: "He is an experienced scholar and teacher who

understands the cultural and spiritual power of the academy and is conversant with contemporary intellectual currents."

Such insights were demonstrated during John's tenure editing *The Banner*, the official magazine of the Christian Reformed Church. "John is a gifted man of God who has exercised his denomination's trust as its mouthpiece during a transitional decade."

academy is still growing." John's heart for and skill at effective ambassadorship promises more opportunities for communicating the ICS mission to long-term supporters and global newcomers alike.

To the task of chief administrator, John Suk brings a servant's heart. "Servant leaders use their gifts to mobilize their communities to help make all things new, now," he says. In his work at Asian Theological Seminary he has learned that "servant leaders ask questions and humbly listen before they act." His love for community comes through in his support of the ICS mission: "ICS values a

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Endings and Beginnings

n June 30 an important phase of my journey with the Institute for Christian Studies reached its conclusion. That journey began in 1970 when, as a recent graduate of Dordt College, I was persuaded that the fledgling graduate school in Toronto was THE place to go for a year, to deepen my Christian worldview before going on to seminary. That 'one year plan' became a 35 year sojourn, and I have no regrets that God steered my life in this direction. I was proud to be part of the Institute's first formal graduating class in 1975, along with Masuo Miyasaki (who returned to a leadership position in Japan), Lambert Zuidervaart (now at ICS), John Hull (The King's), Brad Breems and Don Sinnema (both at Trinity Christian College).

Ten years later, I was astonished when the Board of Trustees offered me an appointment to teach Philosophy of Education at ICS; as a student, I placed the 'Senior Members' at ICS on a fairly high pedestal, and it was

difficult to place myself in that company as a colleague. Five years later I was even more astonished when the Board and the ICS community entrusted me with the role of President. It was an amazing challenge to follow in the footsteps of Bernard Zylstra and Clifford Pitt. I was both humbled and thrilled by this challenge, and for a long time I practically had to pinch myself each morning to think that I was allowed to serve in this capacity. My journey with ICS has taken me through various stages, from student to faculty member to academic colleague to president, and at each stage I've been privileged to learn and to grow, and to be part of the work God's Spirit is doing through the unique and precious institution.

I don't consider my journey with ICS to be finished, however. For one thing, as president of an undergraduate university college, one of

my key challenges will be to participate in the process of faculty recruitment. I want to make sure that my new institution hires people with the qualities of ICS graduates: gifted scholars who know deep, in their souls, what it means to be a Christian scholar and teacher. I've already 'warned' current ICS students that I'll be watching their progress, ready to lure them to Edmonton!

As I have said in various contexts, I believe that ICS is headed for a time of amazing opportunity under the capable leadership of my successor, Dr John Suk. With its new degree-granting authority, a growing and talented student body, strong academic programs, and a dynamic faculty of both seasoned and young scholars, ICS is well-positioned to make a strong contribution to Christian higher education in North America and beyond. My prayer is that God will equip ICS with the resources it needs to make a much-needed contribution

to Christian higher education at the graduate level.

I want to close with a warm THANK YOU to the ICS support community for entrusting me with a leadership role in this unique institution for the past 15 years. I am grateful for the privilege of representing the mission of ICS to provide graduate education inspired by the Gospel's claim that the key to wisdom and knowledge is found in Jesus Christ. I am proud of the Institute's strong support community. You, individually and collectively, have taught me a great deal about commitment, generosity and grace. I appreciate your prayers, support, encouragement, and, in many cases, friendship. Thank you for allowing me to serve in this capacity. May God richly bless ICS in the years to come <

"A Truly Memorable Moment"

n June 13, Royal Assent was given in the Ontario Legislature for "Bill Pr14." This innocuous-sounding code was important to ICS as the piece of legislation intended to amend what we at ICS know as the ICS Act.

Royal Assent was merely the final necessary formality. On June 8, Bill Pr14 had been approved by the Committee on the Regulations and Private Bills. The Bill was sponsored by MPP Rosario Marchese, whose support for the Bill had been invaluable throughout its long process of gestation. Harry Fernhout, in one of his final presidential acts - perhaps his most symbolically significant - took his seat at the table and spoke briefly but lucidly to the motion to pass the Bill.

It was truly a memorable moment for

myself, Student Services Director Pam Trondson and outgoing Associate Academic Dean Ansley Tucker as we witnessed ICS

history in the making. The amended ICS Act authorizes ICS, for the first time in its 37-year history, to grant its own MA and PhD degrees.

Since 1984 ICS has been empowered to grant the M.Phil.F (Master of Philosophical Foundations) degree. But this nomenclature was deliberately unusual, and it often generated problems for ICS graduates in gaining recognition for their ICS programs elsewhere. In

addition, since the early 1980's ICS students have been able to enroll - at dissertation stage - in the doctoral program at the Free

University of Amsterdam. This was an excellent arrangement and it will continue in the future in a different form. But it left the

content of our doctoral program wholly determined by the Free University, and the credibility of our program entirely dependent on that afforded by them. Moreover, it depended on successive renewals of ministerial consent by the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.

The amended ICS Act offers us independence on both counts. It is a hugely significant symbolic public confirmation of ICS's

academic excellence. We give thanks to God for this wonderful gift. 🕰

spirit of partnership, dialogue, and respect for diversity," he says. He wants to help the community achieve its own ideals in whatever way

Eagerness to communicate ICS's vision and mission comes naturally to a man who has been nurtured within the ICS community and who loves that community deeply. In his varying experiences as student, scholar, editor, preacher, high school teacher and professorboth within and outside that community—John Suk learned the strength of the perspective that nurtured him. Along the way, he says, "I've discovered that my reformational perspective is a great filter for understanding the world." No matter the distance between Manila and Toronto, between professorship and presidency. The most important distance is that of the heart. There, Dr. John Suk and the ICS are in exactly the same place.

Board of Trustees Meeting

Chairman Mark Davies opened our May 27 ICS Board Meeting by reminding us of the need for FROG: Full Reliance on God. It was an important reminder of what must guide us in a meeting that, even more than usual, was busy, difficult and momentous.

Momentous: Approval of a new President: John Suk (effective in mid-2006); a report on rapid progress on the ICS amendment in the Ontario legislature (since passed!).

Difficult: A lot of discussion of the severe staff cutbacks, and a recognition that better planning and more consultation is needed to deal with funding shortfalls; and farewell to outgoing President Harry Fernhout who has shown outstanding leadership, and will be sorely missed.

Busy: In addition to the foregoing, approval of the budget and the recommendation to search for an interim President; approval of the Senate's recommendation to reappoint Jonathan Chaplin, Adrienne Dengerink Chaplin and Doug Blomberg; discussion of future relations with the Vrije

Universiteit; and congratulations to Lambert Zuidervaart on receipt of an important grant.
